## Supporting and Connecting With Veterans in the Fairport Schools



It is a brand new school year and with a new year, come new opportunities for community connections within the Fairport schools. To that end, teaching our students how to support veterans comes to mind. I appreciate the opportunity to share a few thoughts and ideas about this and hope that this article provides a springboard for forging many new connections with our community of veterans at V.F.W. Post 8495. This post has been generous with their support of programs in our school district and continuing this mutually beneficial relationship is a goal that is

worth the time.

Let's begin with a look at the definition of a teacher and the definition of a veteran. A teacher is a person who provides education for students, and a classroom may extend beyond the walls of a school. A veteran is anyone who has served in the armed forces and, just as the learning for students can take place beyond the school, a veteran's protection and

service may extend beyond the borders of our country. So now that we made that connection, why DO we teach students to support veterans? The answer to that question is multi-faceted. Students enjoy the freedom to attend school, choose to practice a religion of their choice or not to practice any religion, learn what it means to be an active citizen, and can do much more in part, thanks to our veterans. Beginning in kindergarten, our youngest students learn what it means to be a citizen of the U.S.A. They are taught ways to actively participate in a community, how to demonstrate good citizenship and how to respect those who protect such rights. Here is where our veterans come in. By encouraging students to learn about relatives, friends, and neighbors that are veterans, students are better able to connect what they are learning in school to real people. This, in turn, results in an even greater appreciation for those who served, and builds stronger community connections.

Why is this important to me as a teacher? As a child, my nine siblings and I were encouraged by our parents to attend all of the patriotic parades, visit our relatives' graves to put flags on the veterans' ones, and thank those who served our country. These traditions stuck with me and slowly became a part of what I did as a teacher over the last twenty-eight years. At Jefferson Avenue School, some of these events have included our annual school-wide Veterans Day Assembly that is now entering its' eleventh year and is highly supported by V.F.W. Post 8495. During this assembly, students in grades two through five each share a special letter that they write to thank veterans, all of the children sing songs to the veterans, patriotic artwork is prominently displayed, and refreshments and cards are given to all of the veterans in attendance, which has ranged from fifty-five to eighty veterans. A slideshow of veterans is also enjoyed by all, and many veterans go back to classrooms after the program to share in small groups. It is truly a whole school community effort and the veterans who have attended really enjoy the event each year.

Other projects at J.A. that have involved this post and veterans include quite a variety of supported events. A few years ago, I set up a program where students could interview a veteran and then I shared CD's of these interviews with each veteran and family. One year we also held a walk to raise money for Honor Flight and donated the money raised to help send a veteran to D.C. Another activity happened around Memorial Day in May when Mike Cialini came in and shared a presentation about this holiday with our team of second graders. He and other members have also brought in memorabilia related to the military to share in small groups with our second grade students over the years. The children enjoyed trying on different military gear, looking at beautiful models of planes and asking questions about some of the food items, photos and other interesting items that were shared. This post has also generously supported our students with hand held American flags to wave at our annual Flag Day ceremony on June 14th. At other times they have provided poppies for Fairport students to learn about Flanders Fields and this tradition, too. Last year as part of our community day project, this post generously supported our students with an outreach program where packages were sent overseas to active military that supported over two hundred veterans. We are grateful for all of this support!

With all of these yearly events happening at Jefferson Avenue School, it was no surprise that ALL of last years' winners of the Voice of Democracy and Patriot Pen contests were Jefferson Avenue alumni. The students have been learning about and writing to veterans for years. They were also Martha Brown alumni, one of our middle schools that encourage the older students to rake yards for veterans on Veterans Day. This mutual learning and respect is what teachers hope for and it is fulfilling to see the fruits of our labor come to fruition in our community with our veterans.

So, where do we go from here to build upon all of this? There is so much that can be done! If you are a veteran, consider reaching out to the school-aged children in your neighborhood or young relatives. Ask if they might want you to come in and share with their class about your experience, or read a book on veterans to them. If that isn't your preference, just talk with the child about what you have done to serve our country and offer to share any photos of your time in the service that you may have. Many teachers in all of our schools create displays of photos or read books about veterans to students. If there are teachers or other school staff in your neighborhood, offer to do the same kinds of things. Who knows? You may be the one to help bring more veterans to even more students in our communities.

In Fairport we are also looking at opportunities to promote educational equity and diversity. To this end, female veterans could be honored on International Women's Day in March. Furthermore, the role of African American and Native American veterans in our country could be highlighted in ways that also honor their service. In conclusion, the opportunities that V.F.W. Post 8495 has given to our students and community over the years have been greatly appreciated, and we welcome the chance to not only continue this partnership, but to build on it in new ways. Veterans protect all citizens, help us teach students about good citizenship and are a vital part of our community. Thank you for your service to our country, your service to our community and for helping us to help students support all veterans, young and old alike.
